## **Call for Entries**

### ***The Art of Photography Today 2 An Open Competition***

**Deadline: October 1, 2010**

**Eligibility:** The exhibition is open to all domestic and international, professional and amateur photographers of at least 18 years of age, working with digital or traditional photography or a combination of both. **The Camera Obscura Gallery** invites photographers working in all mediums, styles and schools of thought to participate in its exhibitions. Traditional, contemporary, and experimental photograph-based mixed techniques are welcome.

The jurors will select approximately 50 - 75 photographs to be shown in an eight-week exhibition at the prestigious Camera Obscura Gallery, one of the world's oldest photography galleries. Exhibition dates are from December 10, 2010 through February 5, 2011. Accepted works must remain in The Camera Obscura Gallery until the close of exhibition.

Accepted works must arrive for exhibition framed, using only Plexiglas or acrylic. Camera Obscura Gallery will accept no responsibility for any loss to framed artwork that uses any other glass.

**Jurors: Hal Gould and Loretta Young-Gautier:**

**HAL D. GOULD**, M. Photog. (American, b. 1920)

For over 40 years, Hal Gould has operated showcases for fine-art photography. In 1963, he founded the Colorado Photographic Art Center — one of the first venues devoted exclusively to showing and promoting photography as a medium for fine art. In 1980, he opened The Camera Obscura Gallery and has since built a reputation for exhibiting stellar masters such as Ansel Adams, Edward and Brett Weston, Andre Kertesz, Manuel Alvarez Bravo, Imogen Cunningham, Paul Strand, Edward S. Curtis, Sebastiao Salgado, Philippe Halsman, W. Eugene Smith and many others. In May of 2010, he was awarded with the prestigious Bonfils-Staton Foundation Award for the Arts & Humanities.

Not only has Gould been a tireless advocate of photographic art, but he himself is a Master Photographer. The same artistry that he promotes in his Denver gallery is evident in his own work. After training at the Art Institute of Chicago in the 1940s as a portrait painter, he was inspired by photographers such as Alfred Stieglitz and Man Ray and embarked on photographic studies at the Institute and at Ray Vogue School of Photography. For 25 years, he operated a commercial studio and photographed everything from portraits to architecture. During this time, he also pursued his personal vision, a vision that reflects a broad diversity of style and technique.

Photographs by Hal Gould in many corporate and private collections and have been widely exhibited, including at the Denver Art Museum. He has received numerous awards, including the prestigious National Award, the Professional Photographers of America's top award, and the Gold Medal Grand Prize in the International Federation of Photographer's Competition in Riga, Latvia. He is a certified appraiser of photographs.

**LORETTA YOUNG-GAUTIER** (American, b. 1960)

Loretta Young-Gautier is currently Associate Director of The Camera Obscura Gallery. She has worked alongside Hal Gould for the past 15 years as assistant curator, book-buyer and editor of the *Photography in the Fine Arts Newsletter*. She has juried several exhibitions, including the Five-State Competition at the Hays Council for the Arts in Hays, Kansas, the Colorado Photographic Arts Center Members Exhibition, and the Chicano Humanities and Arts Council in Denver. She was the co-curator with Mollie Uhl Eaton of the *Hal Gould Retrospective: Visual Legacy* in 1999.

Darkroom manipulation became the focus of Young-Gautier's photography work while studying with Denver photographers Ron Wohlauer and Ray Whiting in the early 1980s. Later workshop studies with multiple image master Jerry N. Uelsmann inspired further exploration.

Through multiple exposures, negative sandwiching, combination printing and recent digital techniques, Young-Gautier creates images using the camera, computer and darkroom. She has exhibited her work in numerous national group and solo shows, including the prestigious Coors Western Art Show at the National Western Stock Show and the San Diego Natural History Museum. Her work is meticulously crafted, sometimes taking weeks to create a single image. She produces a limited edition of no more than 25 archival silver gelatin or pigment inkjet prints.

Photographs by Loretta Young-Gautier are included in nationwide private, corporate and museum collections and have been published in *Photo Review*, *Icon*, *Masterpiece Magazine*, *The Photographers Market* and *Passion Press*. A Colorado native, Loretta currently lives in Indian Hills, Colorado.

## **Frame Size Limits and Matting Requirements for Accepted Exhibition Photos:**

All entries must be available for sale.

The largest framed dimension should be no larger than 40". Only white and off-white mats, please. If the nature of your work **requires** the piece not be framed and/or matted, please email us at [entries@cameraobscuragallery.com](mailto:entries@cameraobscuragallery.com) before submitting the work for jurying, explaining why.

## **Entry Fee (non-refundable):**

The non-refundable entry fee is \$35 USD for the first three images. Additional images may be submitted for \$12 each. Maximum number of images that may be submitted: 12
